Keeping it in the family

In 1901, Henry Phipps Jr., the second biggest shareholder of the Carnegie Steel Co. at the time, participated in what was then the world's largest personal transaction when the company was sold to the United States Steel Corporation for \$480 million (equivalent to \$13 billion today). That fortune is still held by Phipps' ancestors who have continued his legacy either through philanthropy or, in some cases, art. Now on display at Ann Norton Sculpture Gardens is "Art in the Family Tree," a collection of Phipps family artwork including sculptures, paintings, drawings and more from family members like Susie Phipps Cochran, Jay Cochran, Rafe Cochran, Hubert Phipps, Michael Phipps and Diana Guest.
